On the 5th November 1605, Guy Fawkes tried to blow up the houses of parliament.













- Guy Fawkes and his group put 36 barrels of gunpowder in cellars underneath the Houses of Parliament in London, ready to set off a massive explosion.
- One member of Fawkes' group sent a letter to his friend who worked in Parliament, warning him to stay away on the 5th November. The Kings supporters found the letter and the plot was ruined.

King James the 1st had different religious beliefs to Guy Fawkes and his group. They felt the King was treating them unfairly.
